COLLECTS AND READINGS

Collect for the week: O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy: Increase and multiply upon us your mercy; that with you as our ruler and guide, we may so pass through things temporal that we finally lose not the things eternal: Grant this, heavenly Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our Lord. **Amen.**

Old Testament: Wisdom I: 13-15, 2: 23-24

Because God did not make death, and he does not delight in the death of the living. For he created all things so that they might exist; the generative forces of the world are wholesome, and there is no destructive poison in them, and the dominion of Hades is not on earth. For righteousness is immortal. For God created us for incorruption, and made us in the image of his own eternity, but through the devil's envy death entered the world, and those who belong to his company experience it.

Psalm 30

I will extol you, O Lord, for you have drawn me up, and did not let my foes rejoice over me.

O Lord my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me.

O Lord, you brought up my soul from Sheol, restored me to life from among those gone down to the Pit.

Sing praises to the Lord, O you his faithful ones, and give thanks to his holy name.

For his anger is but for a moment; his favour is for a lifetime.

Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes with the morning.

As for me, I said in my prosperity, 'I shall never be moved.'

By your favour, O Lord, you had established me as a strong mountain;

you hid your face; I was dismayed. To you, O Lord, I cried,

and to the Lord I made supplication: 'What profit is there in my death, if I go down to the Pit? Will the dust praise you?

Will it tell of your faithfulness? Hear, O Lord, and be gracious to me! O Lord, be my helper!'

You have turned my mourning into dancing; you have taken off my sackcloth and clothed me with joy, so that my soul may praise you and not be silent.

O Lord my God, I will give thanks to you for ever.

Epistle: 2 Corinthians 8: 7-15

Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something— now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written, 'The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little.'

New Testament/Gospel: St Mark 5: 21-43

When lesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered round him; and he was by the lake. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, 'My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live.' So he went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her haemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, lesus turned about in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' And his disciples said to him, 'You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, "Who touched me?" 'He looked all round to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease.' While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, 'Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?' But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, 'Do not fear, only believe.' He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, 'Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, 'Talitha cum', which means, 'Little girl, get up!' And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

Post Communion Prayer: Eternal God, comfort of the afflicted and healer of the broken, you have fed us at the table of life and hope. Teach us the ways of gentleness and peace, that all the world may acknowledge the kingdom of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

Appointment: The Dean is delighted to announce the appointment of the Rev'd Dr Leonard Madden as curate-assistant of Limerick City Parish.

Leonard grew up near Clonakilty, in West Cork. He studied English and Philosophy in UCC, his doctoral work being on Samuel Beckett's early poems and prose, and taught in the Department of English. He and his wife, Catherine, moved to Celbridge in 2011, where they have lived until now. Leonard has worked in the HSE and in the Teaching Council, and has volunteered with Fáilte Isteach, teaching conversational English to people who have newly arrived in Ireland. Catherine works in the Representative Church Body of the Church of Ireland, as the Synod Officer.

Leonard began training in the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in 2018; during his time there he has won prizes in Greek, divinity, and Anglican theology. He was, for several years, an acolyte, and, for several years more, a liturgical verger in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin. He was ordained to the diaconate in 2020, and, during the last academic year has served as deacon intern in Blessington Union of Parishes in the diocese of Glendalough, and straddling the border of county Wicklow and county Kildare.

Dr Madden will begin his ministry here following his ordination to the priesthood in Saint Mary's Cathedral on Saturday 11th September. The Dean's Vicar will conclude her time in Limerick City Parish on Sunday 5th September.

Please do pray for Leonard and his wife Catherine at this time of transition for them.

From the Clergy: As we emerge slowly from a long period of isolation and semi-isolation, the clergy are very keen to resume household visits. This has been made possible, to some degree, by the fact that we both have had all our vaccinations against Covid 19.

Bishop to retire: At the end of the Diocesan Council Meeting on Thursday 17th June Bishop Kearon announced that he would be retiring at the end of October after 7 years in post. Bishop Kearon explained that he had been in many long discussions with Bishop Patrick Rooke the Bishop of Tuam, Killala and Achonry and Bishop Patrick had also decided to retire on the 31st October. There had been a similar Diocesan Council meeting being held in Tuam Diocese at the same time and Bishop Patrick had also announced his retirement there.

With the agreement of the two united dioceses, in 2019 the General Synod voted to amalgamate them under the oversight of one bishop upon the next episcopal vacancy. With both bishops retiring at the same time, a new bishop will be elected, probably early in the new year.

Bishop Kearon was ordained in 1981 and served his curacy in the parish of All Saint's Raheny and St John's Coolock in Dublin. He was Dean of Residence at Trinity College, Dublin from 1984 to 1991 when he became Rector of Tullow in Dublin. He became Director of the Irish School of Ecumenics in 1991 and Secretary General of the Anglican Communion in 2005, and was elected bishop of Limerick and Killaloe in 2014.
