COLLECTS AND READINGS

Collect for the week: Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Help us to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that, through patience, and the comfort of your holy word, we may embrace and for ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Old Testament: Jeremiah 31: 7-9

For thus says the Lord: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, 'Save, O Lord, your people, the remnant of Israel.' See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labour, together; a great company, they shall return here. With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn.

Psalm 126

When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, \blacklozenge then were we like those who dream.

Then was our mouth filled with laughter \blacklozenge and our tongue with songs of joy.

Then said they among the nations, \blacklozenge 'The Lord has done great things for them.'

The Lord has indeed done great things for us, \blacklozenge and therefore we rejoiced.

Restore again our fortunes, O Lord, \blacklozenge as the river beds of the desert.

Those who sow in tears \blacklozenge shall reap with songs of joy.

Those who go out weeping, bearing the seed, \blacklozenge will come back with shouts of joy, bearing their sheaves with them.

Epistle: Hebrews 7: 23-28

Furthermore, the former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues for ever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect for ever.

New Testament/Gospel: St Mark 10: 46-52

They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' Jesus stood still and said, 'Call him here.' And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man said to him, 'My teacher, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

Post Communion Prayer: God of all grace, your Son Jesus Christ fed the hungry with the bread of his life and the word of his kingdom. Renew your people with your heavenly grace, and in all our weakness sustain us by your true and living bread, who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

Book on Bishop Graves:

A former bishop of Limerick renowned for his study of Old Irish and the Brehon Laws has had his life chronicled in a new biography. Bishop Charles Graves, who died in 1899, was an Irish mathematician, academic and clergyman best known for his intensive study of Ogham Stones, the Celtic language and the old Irish Brehon Laws. Historian and writer Gerald O' Carroll's 'Charles Graves agus an Athbheochan Cheilteach' published only in Irish, is available in local Limerick bookshops or through siopaleabhar.com

Thursdays in Black ~ Resistance and Resilience:

The campaign is simple but profound. Wear black on Thursdays - declare you are part of the global movement resisting attitudes and practices that permit rape and violence. In this campaign Black is used as a colour of resistance and resilience.
